JANUARY

- 2nd NO TASK
- 9th **Haslingfield Pit** Always a great place to start the year at, this little jewel of chalk grassland in a veritable sea of farmland, supports a wide range of chalk grassland plants, including the nationally scarce, Man Orchid. With great views over Cambridge and the surrounding landscape it is guaranteed that there will be no cobwebs left hanging around by the end of this task! **Meet at Babraham Road Park and Ride.**
- 16th Coldham's Common County Wildlife Site* Coldhams Common is one of the most important sites for wildlife in Cambridge, holding significant areas of species rich grassland as well as areas of scrub and chalk streams. Without suitable management its value would decline. That is why it is essential for the team to head out, tree poppers in hand, to clear away the encroaching scrub.
- Roman Road SSSI A regular site for the team to visit and undertake essential scrub clearance and grass cutting. Without the team the rich chalk grassland flora, and associated fauna, would soon diminish. Meet at Babraham Road Park and Ride.
- 30th **Ickleton Pit** Another small, but very significant site, for the team to keep in good shape. As well as the wide range of chalk grassland plants found here, Roman snails and winter stalkball (a fungi) also make Ickleton Pit their home. **Meet at Babraham Road Park and Ride.**

FEBRUARY

- 6th Roman Road SSSI As above Meet at Babraham Road Park and Ride.
- Wellcome Trust, Hinxton This site may not be a SSSI or County Wildlife Site and it was only created just over 15 years ago, but this site is fast becoming an essential link in a corridor of habitat found along the upper reaches of the River Cam. From pyramidal orchids, to wintering water rail via glow worms, this site supports an impressive array of wildlife. But as with all sites it needs to be managed and that is where the team steps in! Meet at Babraham Road Park and Ride
- 20th Coldham's Common CWS* As above
- Hayley Wood SSSI Another chance for the team to work in this internationally recognised semi-natural ancient woodland. The team will be helping to burn up the waste material from the winter's coppicing work that helps maintain the important populations of woodland flowers, insects and much more besides. Meet at Babraham Road Park and Ride

MARCH

- 6th **Barnwell East LNR* -** A keystone site in the East Cambridge wildlife corridor, Barnwell East holds species rich grassland, areas of scrub and trees as well as a pond. Unfortunately, several invasive plant species and scrub 'growing in the wrong place' need to be dealt with to maintain this sites great value.
- West Pit SSSI* Another former chalk pit with a great view, this site holds the best chalk grassland in Cambridge, by a country mile! To keep the grassland so rich in species the team will need to clear encroaching scrub and cut the areas of ranker grasses.
- 20th Coldham's Common CWS* As above.
- 27th Barnwell East LNR* As above.


Directions to work sites

Barnwell East LNR - Meet at the reserve entrance on Uphall Road, off Coldhams Lane.

Coldhams Common LNR, The Triangle and Rifle Butts – Meet at the layby on Barnwell Road opposite Camgas plc.

West Pit SSSI - The meeting point is at the entrance to East Pit nature reserve on Lime Kiln Road, Cherry Hinton.




