Location	Cambourne, Cambridgeshire with travel to sites across the county
Role Purpose	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • To contribute to the delivery of the survey and monitoring programmes (habitats and species) of the Wider Countryside team, providing advice and support to landowners and communities across the county • To provide the VCO with increased knowledge, skills and hands-on experience in nature conservation work. • To enhance the opportunities of the VCO to access the professional conservation field
Specific Tasks	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Surveys of habitats such as woodland, grassland, hedgerow and watercourses • Planning and undertaking targeted species surveys (e.g. water voles, great crested newts, bats, non-native invasive species) • Assist with the ongoing monitoring programme of County Wildlife Sites including undertaking surveys and producing survey reports • Create Phase 1 habitat maps using GPS and GIS mapping software • Landowner liaison as part of the team's ongoing work • Participate in practical habitat management tasks • Preparation for volunteer work parties e.g. completing risk assessments, tool maintenance and site preparation work • Delivery of community engagement events

Diversity of habitats

Diversity of the role

The role is focussed on the various survey and monitoring programmes within the Wider Countryside team (outdoors in all weathers) and there is plenty of opportunity to get involved with other aspects of the Trust, subject to the interests of the VCO and availability of other staff. Current projects and activities within the Wider Countryside team include:

- Water vole surveys along the Bourn Brook
- Ongoing monitoring programme of County and City Wildlife Sites (of which there are 500 across the county), including surveying, report-writing and providing advice to landowners
- Pond creation, restoration and monitoring (using eDNA) for Natural England's Great Crested Newt District Level Licensing Scheme
- River Restoration along the River Granta
- Working with farmer clusters
- Specific surveys to provide an evidence-base for nature conservation (e.g. Protected Road Verges, Nature Networks)
- Biodiversity Net Gain assessments
- Working with volunteer groups
- Attending meetings and committees, e.g. Local Sites panel, Road Verges committee

Great Facilities

Although you will be working across the county, you will be based at the Cambourne office, the headquarters for our three counties. As well as access to surveying equipment and tools for practical tasks, there is an extensive library of books about wildlife and conservation which you will be welcome to use.

Teams working at the Cambourne office include our Executive Board, Finance, Fundraising, Supporter Engagement, IT and Communications Teams, and the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Environmental Records centre share the building. Access to all areas on the ground floor (where you will be based) are level or ramped and there are stairs and a wheelchair accessible lift to the first floor. The office garden makes a lovely space for breaktimes and casual wildlife observations, and in inclement weather the kitchen is a sociable place for lunch.
